Yesterday's Weather: The Prehistory of Climate Change, 1300-1800 looks at how medieval and early modern societies depict the shock of the natural disaster. While the weather is notoriously changeable, human responses to it across time reveal some surprising consistencies, as each era struggles to respond to the durable dilemma of being subject to forces beyond human control. The stories we tell about weather, both then and now, are almost always stories about our own modernity, but it is a modernity experienced as somehow precarious. Looking back at how premoderns wrote about the weather helps us to understand better the stories that we tell ourselves about climate change today.
